

Amy Allman Griffin, 2017 Hall of Fame Inductee, Player

Amy Allman Griffin has dedicated her entire life to the game of soccer, beginning with 14 years as a US Youth Soccer player with Washington State Youth Soccer on various teams and within the US Youth Soccer Olympic Development Program. Griffin went on to play as a goalkeeper at the University of Central Florida and was inducted into the Central Florida Hall of Fame in 1999, the school's second women's soccer honoree.

As a member of the U.S. Women's National Team from 1987 to 1991, Griffin was part of the team that won the first FIFA Women's World Cup in 1991. She earned 24 international caps as a player and was also involved as a coach at the 2007 World Cup, 2008 Beijing Olympics, 2011 World Cup and the 2012 London Olympics. Griffin has also served on the coaching staff for the U.S. Under-17 Women's National Team, U.S. Under-20 Women's National Team and the U.S. Under-23 Women's National Team.



Griffin completed her 22nd season on the University of Washington women's soccer coaching staff in the Fall of 2017. She was named NSCAA Regional Assistant Coach of the Year in 2014. Griffin's coaching experience also includes working as the head coach at the University of New Mexico for three seasons as well as an assistant coach at Santa Clara and San Diego State.

Currently, Griffin coaches the U.S. Deaf Women's National Team. She led the team to the 2016 Deaf World Cup title in Italy, defeating Russia 3-0. At the youth level, Griffin has been coaching within the US Youth Soccer Olympic Development Program since 1995.

Griffin continuously amazes the community with her ability and selflessness to the game and the players.
